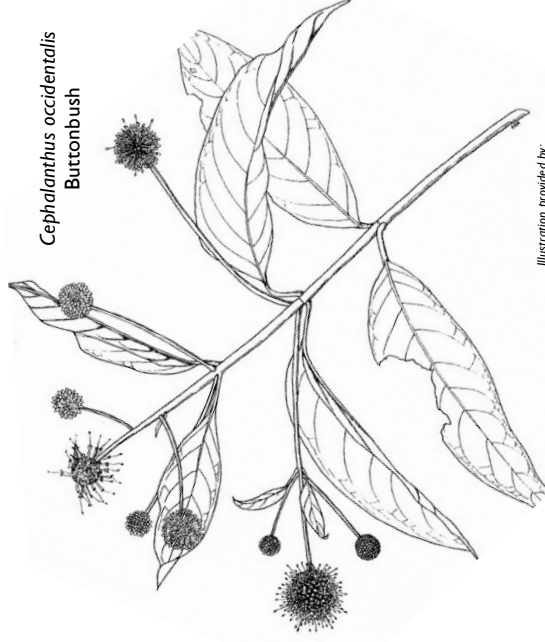

Grown from seeds collected in our region, these natives evolved here, are better adapted to the local environment, and help preserve local pollinators and other wildlife. American Hazelnut <i>Corylus americana</i>	10-15' t 8-13' w	Sun to PS; Moist to Dry	Catkins; Early Spring	A wildlife magnet! Multi-stemmed shrub with yellow to orange and red fall foliage. Produces tasty nuts. Provides cover and nesting for wildlife. <b>CT E</b>
Bayberry <i>Morella carolinensis</i> (syn. <i>Myrica pensylvanica</i> )	5-10' t & w	Sun to PS; Avg. to Dry	Yellow (inconspicuous); Summer	Semi-evergreen with glossy, fragrant leaves and waxy gray berries. Burgundy to bronze fall foliage. Good for massing, hedges. Provides food and cover for birds. Tolerates drought, salt spray and sandy, rocky soil. <b>CT DR RG P</b>
Bebb's Willow <i>Salix bebbiana</i>	10-25' t 10-15' w	Sun to PS; Moist to Wet	Catkins; Early Spring	Multi-stemmed shrub with maroon twigs. Attracts bees, butterflies. Good in waterside buffers. Tolerates rocky soil, heavy clay soils. <b>CT RG P</b>
Black Chokeberry <i>Aronia melanocarpa</i>	3-6' t 3-5' w	Sun to PS; Avg. to Moist	White; May	Compact shrub with glossy leaves, fragrant flowers and edible black-purple fruits. Deep red fall foliage. Tolerates salt and poor soil. <b>CT DR RG E P</b>
Buttonbush <i>Cephalanthus occidentalis</i>	6-12' t 4-8' w	Sun to PS; Moist to Wet	White; Early Summer	Showy shrub with fragrant, long-lasting, flowers clustered in dense globes. Attracts bees, butterflies. Tiny nutlets provide food for waterfowl. <b>CT RG P</b>
Eastern Hop-hornbeam <i>Ostrya virginiana</i>	25-40' t 15-40' w	Sun to Shade; Avg. to Moist	Catkins; Spring	Showy clusters of nutlets. Birch-like leaves. Shaggy bark provides winter interest. Sensitive to salt, flooding. Good for wooded edge, by patio. <b>CT DR</b>
Eastern Red Cedar <i>Juniperus virginiana</i>	40-50'	Sun; Avg. to Dry	Berry-like cones	Fast growing pyramid-shaped evergreen with flat needles. Exfoliating bark is of ornamental interest. Attracts birds. Good for screen or hedge. <b>CT DR</b>
Gray Dogwood <i>Swida racemosa</i>	10-15' t & w	Sun to PS; Avg. to Moist	White; May	Fragrant flowers yield white to pale blue fruits on persistent red stalks. Great color contrast in winter. Good fall color. Tolerates drought. <b>CT DR RG P</b>
Honeysuckle, Trumpet <i>Lonicera sempervirens</i> 'Major Wheeler'	3-20' t to 12' w	Sun to PS; Avg. to Moist	Deep red; Summer	Deciduous vine with showy tubular flowers. Attracts songbirds, hummingbirds, butterflies. Mildew free. Good for a trellis, fence or arbor. <b>CT DR P</b>
Mountain Holly (female/male) <i>Ilex mucronata</i> (limited qty.)	14-20' t 6-12' w	Sun to PS; Avg. to Moist	White; May	Easy to grow as shrub or small tree. Showy flower clusters. Blue-black fruits persist through winter. Wine-red fall color. Attracts bees, birds. <b>CT RG P</b>
New Jersey Tea <i>Ceanothus americanus</i>	3-4' t & w	Sun to PS; Avg. to Dry	White; May to June	Compact, nitrogen-fixing shrub with clusters of fragrant flowers. Good for wooded edge, borders, dry and rocky slopes. Use leaves for tea. <b>CT DR P</b>
Northern Red Oak <i>Quercus rubra</i>	60-75' t to 45' w	Sun; Avg. to Dry	Catkins; Mid-Spring	Fast grower and long-lived. Great shade tree. Brown-red fall foliage. Supports wildlife - birds, mammals, pollinators. Tolerates heat, some drought. <b>CT P</b>
Pitch Pine <i>Pinus rigida</i>	40-60' t 30-50' w	Sun; Moist to Dry	Cones - 2 yrs to mature	Fast grower when young. Deeply furrowed bark and stiff needles. Tolerates dry soil, drought, poor soil, salt. Susceptible to wind damage. <b>CT DR</b>
Red-osier Dogwood <i>Swida sericea</i>	6-9' t 8-12' w	Sun to PS; Moist	White; May to June	Stunning red stems in winter; good fall color. Fragrant flowers give way to showy white berries. Hardy and adaptable. Great for massing. <b>CT DR RG P</b>
River Birch <i>Betula nigra</i> (single stem)	40-70' t 40-60' w	Sun to PS; Moist	Catkins; Mid-Spring	Showy winter bark! Fast grower. At maturity, cream-colored bark peels to reveal cinnamon-brown layer. Yellow fall foliage. Disease resistant. <b>CT RG</b>
Shadbush Serviceberry <i>Amelanchier canadensis</i>	6-20' t 6-8' w	Sun to PS; Dry to Moist	White; March to April	Clumping form. Fragrant flowers and edible, small, apple-like fruits. Orange to rusty-red fall color. Attracts birds, bees, and butterflies. <b>CT E DR RG P</b>
Summersweet <i>Clethra alnifolia</i>	3-10' t 4-6' w	Sun to PS; Avg. to Wet	White; Summer	Showy, fragrant flower clusters. Glossy leaves. Yellow fall color. Good for low spots, coastal gardens, erosion control. Tolerates salt spray. <b>CT DR RG P</b>
Sweetfern <i>Comptonia peregrina</i>	2-4' t 4-8' w	Sun to PS; Dry to Avg.	Yellow-green; May	Low spreading habit with aromatic fern-like leaves. Good for erosion control, naturalizing. Tolerates poor soil, drought, salt. Attracts butterflies. <b>CT DR P</b>
Withe-rod Viburnum <i>Viburnum nudum</i>	5-12' t & w	Sun to PS; Avg. to Wet	White; Summer	Showy clusters of fragrant flowers yield multi-colored fruits. Leathery leaves turn red-purple in fall. Tolerates flooding, soil compaction. <b>CT RG P</b>
Winterberry (female/male) <i>Ilex verticillata</i> 'Red Sprite/Jim Dandy'	3-9' t & w (f) to 12' t & w	Sun to PS; Avg. to Wet	White; June	Deciduous holly good for naturalizing. Persistent bright red berry clusters on females provide visual interest and wildlife food in winter. <b>CT DR RG</b>

Asparagus, <i>Asparagus officinalis</i> 'Mary Washington'	3-4' t 1-1.5' w	Sun; Well-drained		Heirloom variety! Succulent spears with excellent flavor; great for freezing. Productive, winter hardy, heat tolerant, resistant to rust. Sold in 10-packs. <b>E</b>
Black Elderberry <i>Sambucus nigra</i> ssp. <i>canadensis</i>	5-12' t & w	Sun to PS; Avg. to Wet	Creamy white; June to July	Fast grower and colony forming. Profuse fragrant flowers attract pollinators. Purple-black fruits attract wildlife. Great for jams, pies, syrup, wine. Two or more recommended for best fruiting. <b>CT E RG P</b>
Black Raspberry (plugs) <i>Rubus occidentalis</i> 'Bristol Black'	4-5' t 3-4' w	Sun; Moist	White; Mid-Summer	High-yielding early variety with large, glossy black fruit. Vigorous growth. Winter hardy. Tolerates powdery mildew. Sold in 5 plug bundles. <b>CT E P</b>
Blueberry, Highbush (sets of 3) <i>Vaccinium corymbosum</i>	6-12' t & w	Sun to PS; Moist	Pink-white; Spring to Summer	Abundant berry producer! Foliage turns yellow-red-burgundy in fall, bark is red or yellow-green in winter. Sold in sets of 3, one of each variety (early, mid-season, late blooming) to lengthen harvest season. <b>CT E RG P</b>

Blue Rug Juniper <i>Juniperus horizontalis</i> 'Wiltonii'	8-12" t 6-8' w	Sun to PS; Dry to Avg.	Non-flowering	Easy-to-grow evergreen with trailing branches. Soft textured blue-green foliage turns purplish in winter. Tolerates salt, drought, wind. <b>CT DR</b>
Fragrant Sumac <i>Rhus aromatica</i> 'Gro-Low'	1-2' t 5-8' w	Sun to PS; Dry to Avg.	Yellow; April	Fast, compact grower. Stunning red-orange fall foliage, fragrant flowers, red fruits. Attracts birds, butterflies. Tolerates poor soils, drought. <b>CT P</b>

Field Pussytoes <i>Antennaria neglecta</i>	6-12" t & w	Sun to PS; Avg. to Dry	White; Spring	Great for dry, sunny sites. Velvety basal leaves; tufted flowers look like tiny cat paws, bloom on stalks. Attracts butterflies. Drought tolerant. <b>CT DR P</b>
Golden Groundsel <i>Packera aurea</i>	1-3' t 6-18" w	Sun to Shade; Avg. to Moist	Golden yellow; May to June	Great for naturalizing in moist, shady areas. Profuse bloomer! Showy clusters of daisy-like flowers on stalks rise above heart-shaped basal leaves. <b>CT DR P</b>
Partridgeberry <i>Mitchella repens</i>	to 2" t to 12" w	PS to Shade; Avg. to Moist	White; Spring	Evergreen, trailing woody vine. Dark-green glossy foliage and persistent red berries. Great for woodland gardens with acidic soil. <b>CT DR P</b>
Wild Ginger <i>Asarum canadense</i>	6-12" t 12-18" w	PS to Shade; Avg. to Moist	Purple-brown; Spring	A great naturalizer! Bell-shaped flowers hide beneath velvety green heart-shaped leaves. Great for woodland gardens. Provides wildlife cover. <b>CT DR</b>

Allegheny Monkeyflower <i>Mimulus ringens</i>	1-3' t to 1' w	Sun to PS; Moist to Wet	Purple-blue; Summer	A true wetland plant! Paired, long-stalked flowers look like tiny monkey faces. Soil moisture and fertility determine size. Bumblebee pollinated. <b>CT DR RG P</b>
Bird's-foot Violet <i>Viola pedata</i>	4-10" t & w	Sun to PS Avg. to Dry	Purple; April to June	Showy blooms rise from clumps of deeply divided bird's-foot-shaped leaves. Self-seeder. Well-drained soils a must! Great for rock gardens. <b>CT DR P</b>
Cardinal Flower <i>Lobelia cardinalis</i>	2-3' t 8-18" w	Sun to PS; Moist to Wet	Red; July to Sept.	Dense clumps with spikes of bright, showy, profuse tubular flowers. Attracts butterflies, hummingbirds, songbirds. Great for massing. <b>CT DR RG P</b>
Marsh Marigold <i>Caltha palustris</i>	1-2' t 1-1.5' w	Sun to PS; Moist to Wet	Bright Yellow; April to June	Showy and easy-to-grow. Clump-forming with basal heart-shaped leaves. Tolerates shallow standing water. Attracts bees, beetles, flies. <b>CT DR P</b>
New England Aster <i>Symphotrichum novae-angliae</i>	3-6' t 2-3' w	Sun; Avg. to Moist	Rose-purple; Summer to Fall	Showy and easy-to-grow. Clump-forming with stout stems and daisy-like flowers. Great fall nectar source for butterflies, moths. <b>CT DR RG P</b>
Purple Joe-Pye Weed <i>Eupatorium purpureum</i>	5-7' t 2-4' w	Sun to PS; Moist	Mauve; Summer to Fall	Showy flower clusters. A magnet for bees, butterflies. Clump-forming with sturdy stems and leaves in whorls. Great for massing. <b>CT DR RG P</b>
Short-toothed Mountain Mint <i>Pycnanthemum muticum</i>	1-3' t & w	Sun to PS; Avg. to Moist	Pinkish; Summer	#1 for pollinators! Sturdy stems, fragrant minty foliage, clusters of tiny tubular flowers subtended by silvery leaves. Vigorous, drought tolerant. <b>CT DR RG P</b>
Swamp Loosestrife <i>Decodon verticillatus</i>	6-8' t & w	Sun to PS; Moist to Wet	Deep Pink; July to Sept.	Fast-growing and shrub-like, with arching stems to 9 ft. long and often rooting at tips. Showy bell-shaped flowers and willow-like leaves. <b>CT DR</b>
White Goldenrod <i>Solidago bicolor</i>	2-3' t 1-2' w	Sun to PS; Avg. to Dry	Cream; Summer to Fall	Long-blooming pollinator favorite. Only white goldenrod in eastern U.S. Tolerates salt, drought. Great for rock gardens, wooded edges. <b>CT DR P</b>
Wild Bergamot (a.k.a. Bee Balm) <i>Monarda fistulosa</i>	2-4' t 12-18" w	Sun to PS; Avg. to Moist	Lavender; June to August	Showy flowers and fragrant foliage. A must for avid butterfly and hummingbird gardeners. Tolerates drought. Great cut flower. <b>CT RG DR P</b>

Hay-scented Fern <i>Dennstaedtia punctilobula</i>	18-24" t 2-3' w	PS to Shade; Avg. to Moist	Non-flowering	Erect to arching fronds turn yellow in the fall. Fronds fragrant when bruised. Spreads to form colonies. Good for naturalizing in woodland areas. <b>CT DR</b>
Marginal Wood Fern <i>Dryopteris marginalis</i>	18-24" t & w	PS to Shade; Avg. to Moist	Non-flowering	Easy to grow. Evergreen fronds provide winter interest. Non-spreading. Good for massing in shady areas, woodlands or rock gardens. <b>CT DR RG</b>
Sensitive Fern <i>Onoclea sensibilis</i>	to 4' t 1-1.5' w	PS to Shade; Moist	Non-flowering	Erect to arching sterile fronds die back at first frost. Fertile fronds with bead-like spore cases persist through winter. Forms colonies. <b>CT DR RG</b>
Switch Grass <i>Panicum virgatum</i>	3-6' t 2-3' w	Sun; Avg. to Moist	Pinkish; Late Summer	Clump-forming with arching foliage topped with airy flower clusters. Yellow fall color. Attracts birds. Tolerates drought, some flooding. <b>CT DR RG</b>
Cape Breeze Switch Grass <i>Panicum virgatum</i> 'Cape Breeze'	24-30" t 18-30" w	Sun; Dry to Moist	Pinkish; Late Spring	Clump-forming with arching foliage topped with airy flower clusters. Grows best in poor soil; rich soil causes plant to flop. Tolerates drought. <b>CT DR RG</b>
Pennsylvania Sedge <i>Carex pensylvanica</i>	6-12" t 12-18" w	PS to Shade; Dry to Moist	Green-Brown; Summer	Grass-like clumps with glossy foliage. Great for massing; excellent ground cover/lawn substitute. Thrives under oaks, maples. Attracts birds. <b>CT DR</b>
Seersucker Sedge <i>Carex plantaginea</i>	6-12" t to 12" w	PS to Shade; Moist to Dry	Brown-purple; Spring	Clump-forming evergreen with broad leaves that are puckered along the veins. Good textural accent. Good choice for shady borders, rock gardens. <b>CT DR</b>
Soft Rush <i>Juncus effusus</i>	3-4' t 2-3' w	Sun; Wet to Moist	Green-brown; Summer	Striking wetland plant with clumping, upright stems. Tolerates salt, clay. Great vertical accent. Attracts wetland birds, amphibians, muskrats. <b>CT DR</b>
